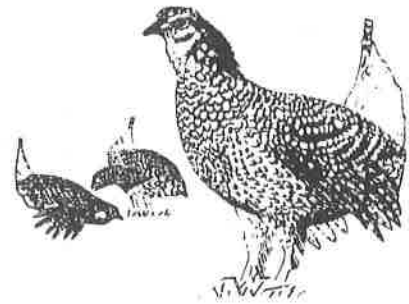

FALL Council Meeting

The Executive Council of the North Dakota Chapter of The Wildlife Society met at the headquarters of J. Clark Salyer NWR, 12:30 P.M., 23 September 1983. The following Council members were present: Lloyd Jones, Ken Higgins, Dave Sharp, Mike McEnroe, Pam Soine, Mike Johnson and Eric Bakke. Other members in attendance included Bill Berg, Darold Walls, Fred Giese, Patsy Crooke and Tedd Gutzke.

President Lloyd Jones called the meeting to order. Mike Johnson moved to accept the minutes of the last Council meeting as they were printed in the newsletter, Mike McEnroe seconded; motion carried. The following Treasurer's report was reviewed:

Patsy Crooke moved to accept the Treasurer's report, McEnroe seconded; motion carried.

The Treasurer reported that the Chapter's 3 month certificate of deposit matures on 10/6/83. He requested advise from the Council on reinvestment of these funds. After some discussion, McEnroe moved to consolidate our two time savings deposits and renew the C.D. when it matures. Dave Sharp provided a second and the motion passed.

Chapter Correspondence

- June 2 - Letter from Michael Nethery, State Conservationist, acknowledging receipt of the Chapter's request for information on the Boundary Creek Watershed Project.
- June 10 - Letter from Thomas Kessie, Chairman of the Board, National Audubon Society, in response to the Chapter's letter of support for opening an Audubon field office in North Dakota. The letter thanked the Chapter for its progressive actions on Garrison but gave no indication if an office would be opened.
- June 17 - Letters to Senators Burdick and Andrews and Congressman Dorgan supporting Senate Bill 663 (Sodbuster Bill) which removes economic incentives for conversion of rangeland to cropland.
- June 20 - Letter to Devils Lake Mayor Dennis Riggins pointing out illegal drainage of Lake Irvine upstream in the Devils Lake watershed and pointing out that improper water management is causing a portion of the high water in Devils Lake.

- June 21 - Letter from Senator Burdick acknowledging receipt of the Chapter letter on the Sodbuster Bill and indicating he will keep our concerns in mind.
- June 27 - Testimony, both oral and written, provided to the ND Legislative Council Natural Resources Committee in regards to House Concurrent Resolution No. 3091 dealing with wetlands acquisition in North Dakota. Presented by Wetland Consultant Gary Pearson.
- June 29 - Letter from Representative Dorgan in regards to the Chapter letter in support of the Sodbuster Bill which described at quite length the history and his concern for loss of valuable topsoil. He pointed out the federal subsidies available for conversion of rangeland to cropland and his hopes that the bill will control these problems.
- June 29 - Letter of appreciation to Governor Olson in regards to his testimony before the U.S. Joint Economic Committee supporting U.S. Senate Bill 663 (Sodbuster Bill). The bill would identify and control many aspects of wind and water erosion and conversion of marginal land to cropland.
- July 7 - Received from M. S. Zschomler, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Habitat Resources, a guidebook entitled, "Our National Wetland Heritage; A Protection Guidebook."
- July 7 - Letter from Governor Olson thanking the Chapter for support of his testimony on the "Sodbuster Bill."
- July 8 - Received a \$300 donation from The Living Bird Quarterly for an article written by John Sidle. John requested the money be donated to the Chapter.
- July 11 - Letter from Senator Andrews thanking the Chapter for their support of the Sodbuster Bill and indicating he will fully support its passage.
- July 18 - Testimony, both oral and written, on the public hearing for the Oak Creek Drain in Wells County. The project will drain approximately 2,000 acres of wetlands and outlet into Arrowwood National Wildlife Refuge and the James River, provided by Wetland Consultant Gary Pearson.
- July 19 - Comments to TWS on a draft proposal for an awards program recognizing wildlife values of sand and gravel mined lands.
- July 25 - Letter from Ed Brigham, Regional Vice President of the National Audubon Society, commending the Chapter for its active role in wetland preservation efforts.
- July 29 - Letter from Russell Peterson, President of the National Audubon Society, in response to our letter issuing support for opening an Audubon field office in North Dakota. The letter indicated that Audubon would be focusing its efforts in Washington and had no immediate plans to open an office in North Dakota.
- July 29 - Letter to Colonel Edward Rapp, District Engineer, Corps of Engineers, commending them for well written draft impact statement on the Pembiler River study. The report did not include Pembiler Dam as an alternative to flood control.
- August 2 - Letter from Monty Millard on behalf of Muskies, Inc. soliciting support for a Muskie Symposium to be held in 1984. The Chapter purchased a print and raffle ticket as a donation for \$60.
- August 5 - Letter from George Enyeart indicating that careful consideration be given to continuing the fictional feature in the last newsletter.
- August 10 - Letter to George Enyeart thanking him for taking time to express his concern.

- August 10 - Testimony, both oral and written, presented to the U.S. Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works in regards to the Small Wetlands Acquisition Program. The hearing was in Aberdeen, South Dakota, where Wetland Consultant Gary Pearson represented the Chapter.
- August 10 - Information package from the National Wildlife Federation indicating status on wetland legislation, 404, Dingall-Johnson Expansion, etc.
- August 11 - Letter from James Mann, Forest Supervisor, U.S. Forest Service, acknowledging receipt of the Chapter comments on Mike Creek environmental assessment.
- August 11 - Letter to James Mann, Forest Supervisor, U.S. Forest Service, responding to Medora District Ranger Jerry Reese's comments on our input to developmental planning on Mike's Creek.
- August 12 - Letter from Tom Franklin, TWS Field Director, (letter was sent to all Sections and Chapters in TWS) with a copy of last Chapter newsletter as a prototype of a "especially well prepared, informative and very interesting reading" newsletter.
- August 15 - Invitation to Secretary of Interior James Watt to speak at our annual banquet in February.
- August 22 - Letter from Tom Franklin, Field Director TWS, requesting any information the Chapter has on toxic/non-toxic shot or on old growth forest management.
- September 1 - Application to Devils Lake WMD for a surplus buffalo or elk.
- September 1 - Letter from Sportsman's Alliance of Maine asking for support of their efforts in promoting sound management including hunting of moose in Maine. A statewide referendum will be held on November 8 in regards to prohibiting moose hunting.
- September 1 - Letter from J. Michael Nethery, SCS State Conservationist, providing partial response to the Chapter's previous inquiry for information on the Boundary Creek Watershed Project.
- September 1 - Letter from Douglas Baldwin, Assistant to the Secretary of Interior, in response to a Chapter invitation for Secretary Watt to speak at our annual banquet. The response indicated it was too early for the Secretary to make a commitment.
- September 1 - Letter from the Wisconsin Chapter TWS advertising the sale of Proceedings of the Symposium on Wildlife Management in Private Lands.
- September 7 - Letter to Director, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, opposing proposed rule changes in federal regulations which would allow private salvage of accidentally killed migratory birds. The encouragement of illegal kill and sale of migratory birds as well as the complicated process were cited as reasons.
- September 7 - Information, minutes, treasury report, etc. of CMPS's Annual Meeting from CMPS President Len Carpenter.
- September 14 - Letter to Governor Olson suggesting consideration be given to retaining riparian areas and securing easements on agricultural lands if and when the State Prison Farm is sold.
- September 15 - Application to City of Dickinson for holding a fund raising event.
- September 20 - Letter to Assistant to the Secretary of Interior asking for an indication of when a commitment could be made for the secretary to speak at the annual convention.

The secretary presented the names of several individuals applying for membership: Robert Barta, David Blockstein, Charles Bosch, Timothy Freund, Frank Kartch, Chris Schuler, and Paul Van Ningen. Pam Soine moved that these people be accepted as members, Ken Higgins seconded; motion carried.

Dave Sharp reported that the fund raising committee is gearing up for the annual meeting. He proposed a motion that would give the committee approval to make purchases of items as deemed appropriate for the fund raising auction. Higgins seconded, and the motion passed.

Ken Higgins informed the Council that he and the other members of the nominations committee, have begun preparing a slate of candidates for the annual election. Ken indicated the names of nominees will be distributed to all members at least 30 days before the annual meeting.

The Council reviewed the next installment of "Eco Wars", and discussed its appropriateness as a regular feature of the Chapter newsletter. President Jones read a letter from a Chapter member who expressed his opinion that the feature should be dropped. Several Council members, speaking for other members, voiced concerns about professionalism, and the possibility that continuation could divide the Chapter. The Secretary reminded the Council that "Eco Wars" is fictional satire, providing a humorous viewpoint of some of the important natural resource issues. Pam Soine moved to discontinue "Eco Wars" as a newsletter feature; but make installments available to members providing a stamped, self-addressed envelope. Dave Sharp seconded, and the motion passed.

The idea of a Mallard Symposium, sponsored by the Chapter, was proposed by Mike Johnson. Mike feels that a meeting, similar to the recent Canada Goose Symposium, can help to focus the efforts of professionals concerned with the mallard resource. Mike intends to keep the Council informed as plans materialize.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership - Chairperson Patsy Crooke reported that the Chapter has 241 paid members. Thirty seven members from 1982 have not paid the 1983 dues. Among the ideas proposed for increasing membership was a plan for active members to personally contact those 1982 members whom are delinquent with 1983 dues. Patsy also recommended that invitations to our annual meeting be sent to non-members working with natural resources in western North Dakota.

The idea of printing a Chapter membership directory was discussed. After consideration of the cost and turnover of membership, it was decided that such a directory would have limited usefulness. As an alternative, a decision was made to make the newsletter mailing list available to members upon request.

Dave Sharp reported that the parent society has requested a renewed effort from the Chapter to increase membership in TWS. He made a motion that the Chapter give away eight TWS memberships as door prizes at the annual meeting. The motion passed after a second from Mike Johnson.

Wetland - Bill Berg presented a plan to sell hats with the NDCTWS logo as a means of raising money for the wetland fund. Mike McEnroe moved that Bill go ahead with acquisition of 100 hats, Patsy Crooke seconded; motion carried.

Work is continuing on a wetland informational pamphlet. The committee has provided an outline to four different writers. Plans are to combine the contributions and compile a text for Council approval.

Lloyd informed the Council of a recent State District Court decision that went against a Benson county landowner looking to recover damages resulting from drainage. The defendant is considering an appeal to the State Supreme Court. Our attorneys have recommended that the Chapter file an amicus brief if the matter is appealed. Pam Soine moved that the Chapter enter into the case as a friend of the court, contingent upon appeal by the landowners. The motion also stipulated that we use our own money, up to \$3000, to pay for preparation and filing of a brief. Dave Sharp seconded, and the motion carried.

Ken Higgins lead a discussion of the Chapter's role in educating the public about drainage laws. Methods such as placing newspaper ads and providing informational pamphlets were suggested as positive educational steps. Ken asked the committee to consider these and other options that might raise the level of knowledge about drainage law.

Enforcement - A letter was read from Chairman Gary Rankin, asking for approval of guidelines for a Case of the Year Award, honoring exceptional work in the field of wildlife law enforcement. After review by the Council, Bakke moved to accept the proposal as submitted. Fred Giese seconded, and the motion carried.

The Council also considered a request for formal Chapter support of the R.A.P. (Report All Poachers) program. Discussion revealed that the groundwork for this program is in place, but effectiveness has been impaired by the lack of a reward fund. McEnroe moved that the Chapter write a letter to Chief Warden Goetz, expressing support for R.A.P., and pledging \$250 toward a reward fund. The motion carried after a second from Dave Sharp.

Arrangements - Plans are proceeding for the 1984 annual meeting, February 9, 10 and 11, at the Holiday Inn in Dickinson. The Council approved reservation of a block of 50 rooms at the Holiday Inn. The Secretary was reminded to include reservation cards in the next newsletter. Lloyd reported that the Chapter's name has been entered in a lottery for a buffalo or elk from Sully's Hill Game Preserve. If we receive an animal, the meat will be used as a main course for the Thursday night festivities.

Program - The Program Committee has sent out a first call for papers to all government agencies involved with management of natural resources in western North Dakota. Arrangements for a banquet speaker have not been finalized. A request to Secretary of the Interior, James Watt did not produce a confirmation.

The meeting adjourned at 5:00 P.M.

MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

As of 20 October 1983, the paid membership stands at 257. Twenty one members from 82 have not yet paid their 83 dues. There are 60 people with new memberships and 12 who have dropped their membership from the Chapter.

Potentially, our membership should be about 270, which is where we were during the winter meeting last February. Looks like we still have the problem of people not renewing their memberships. Below is a list of those still owing for 1983. If you know any of these folks, please remind them.

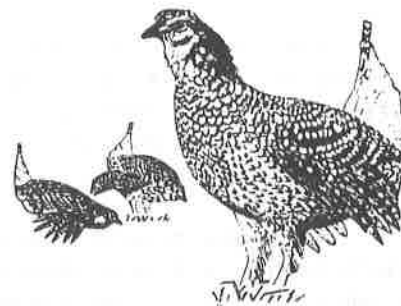

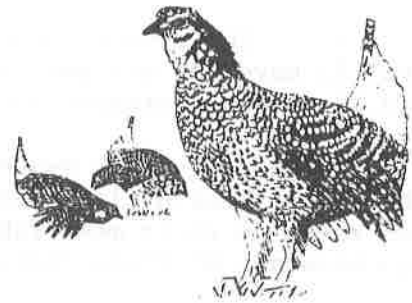
